Barn Theatre to stage its third production of 'Hair'

AUGUSTA - The rock musical Hair opens July 18 at the Barn Theatre for a two-week run through July 30.

This is the third time around for Hair at the Barn, which gave the famous musical its first-ever summer-stock production in 1973 and

another in 1975. As in both earlier Barn productions of Hair, the full stage will be revealed as part of the production design. Lighting instruments and backstage structure are in full view. with the orchestra also on stage. Steel scaffolding is the primary scenic element and a new sound system - designed especially for the show's rock-concert nature - has

The cast of 33 will be headed by Scott Burkell as Claude. Joe Aiello as Berger. Jeff Lettiere as Woof. Sandy Mulvihill as Sheila - all members of the Barn's resident acting company - and Chicago performers E. Faye Butler as Dionne and Jeff Coopwood as

Butler is playing the same role she played in the recent Chicago Vic Theatre production of Hair.

Darius de Haas, another member of the Chicago cast, has been added to the Barn's production. A featured member of "The Tribe." he sines the show's opening number Aquarius.

The Barn's original production of Hair in 1973 was the third show in the theater's history to run for

four weeks. When the musical first hurtled onto the Broadway scene in 1967, it created the greatest theatrical explosion to be seen in years. It was the first free-form "message" rock opera and addressed itself blatantly and irreverently to the mores, codes of behavior, hangups and puritanical traditions that had ruled much of American society

for decades. On this level, Hair is rooted in relation to its time, with its hippies and Vietnam protest - but the show has a core that makes it ring

true today - its protest against perceived prejudice and injustice. An obvious parallel is the recent student uprising in China.

Four of the show's songs -Aquarius, Let the Sunshine In. Hair and Good Morning, Sunshine are established in international musical repertory. The score is the work of Galt MacDermot.

Hair opened at Broadway's Bilt-

more Theatre in April 1968 and its yearly grosses - more than \$28 million - were the greatest in theatrical history.

Brendan Ragotzy is directing the Barn production. Charlies Misovye is choreographer and James Douglas Kent is music director.

Performances will be at 8:30 p.m. Tuesdays thorugh Fridays; 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. Saturdays and 5 p.m. Sundays. Tickets are \$14 Tuesdays thorugh Thrusdays and for the 5 p.m. Sunday shows: \$16.50 on Fridays and for both Saturday performances.

Meanwhile, the British farce Run For Your Wife continues through its final performance on July 16. The new comedy Steel Magnolias is scheduled to follow Hair and open Aug. 1.

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
